In this mid-career retrospective at MOCA Tucson, Folkert de Jong explores themes of global conquest, particularly events tied to The Netherlands yet mirrored and understood within a U.S. historical context. Frequently referencing figures and dress of Old Dutch Masters, de Jong bears witness to traumatic events and invites viewers to share with him in the acknowledgment of the horrors of war and subjugation. This exhibition features notable sculptures, installations, and paintings from the artist's oeuvre, exploring the recurring self-destructive tendency of humanity.



ABOUT THE 2018 MOCA LOCAL GENIUS RECIPIENTS



DR. CAROL A. BARNES is a Regents' Professor in the Departments of Psychology, Neurology and Neuroscience, the Evelyn F. McKnight Endowed Chair for Learning and Memory in Aging, Director of the Evelyn F. McKnight Brain Institute and Director of the Division of Neural Systems, Memory & Aging at the University of Arizona. Dr. Barnes is past-president of the 42,000 member Society for Neuroscience, an elected Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and an Elected Foreign Member of the Royal Norwegian Society of Sciences and Letters.

She earned her B.A. in psychology from the University of California at Riverside, and her M.A. and Ph.D. from Carleton University in Ottawa, Canada.

The central goal of Dr. Barnes' research program is to understand how the brain changes during the aging process and what the functional consequences of these changes are on information processing and memory. Her research program involves behavioral, electrophysiological and molecular biological approaches to the study of young and aged rodents and non-human primates. This work provides a basis for understanding the basic mechanisms of normal aging in the brain and sets a background against which it is possible to assess the effects of pathological changes such as Alzheimer's disease.



THOMAS GROGAN, M.D.

is an American professor, pathologist, and founder of Ventana Medical Systems, Inc. He currently holds the positions of Professor of Pathology at the University of Arizona College of Medicine and Chief Scientific Officer at Ventana. Dr. Grogan received a B.A. in biology from the University of Virginia, and his M.D. from George Washington University Medical School. He later completed a post-doctorate, hematopathology fellowship Stanford University. Dr. Grogan is a founding member of the International Lymphoma Study Group and holds the patents for the kinetic-mode process for automated Immunohistochemistry and "in situ" hybridization staining techniques.

Dr. Grogan has authored or coauthored more than 200 papers on lymphoma and myeloma, including contributing to the World Health Organization's Classification Tumours of Haematopoietic Lymphoid Tissue, part of a series of histological and genetic typing of human tumors that covers all leukemia and lymphoma types, providing a national standard for oncologists and pathologists to use in the design of studies monitoring response to therapy and clinical outcomes.



SUSAN STRYKER, PH.D. is an Associate Professor of Gender and Women's Studies, as well as Director of the Institute for LGBT Studies. She is a multiple award-winning author, editor, and filmmaker whose credits include the Emmy Award-winning Screaming Queens: documentary The Riot at Compton's Cafeteria, the two-volume Transgender massive, Studies Reader, the introductory textbook Transgender History, and popular nonfiction works such as Queer Pulp: Perverse Passions from the Golden Age of the Paperback and Gay by the Bay: A History of Queer Culture in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Stryker earned her Ph.D. in United States History from UC Berkeley and later held a postdoctoral fellowship in Sexuality Studies at Stanford University.

Her work focuses on gender and human sexuality, and in 2013 she established the world's first transgender studies program at the University of Arizona.

In 2015 Yale University awarded Stryker the James Robert Brudner Class of 1983 Memorial Prize for lifetime accomplishment and scholarly contributions in the field of lesbian and gay studies.

FOLKERT DE JONG

Sunday, April 8 - 11am-12pm

Dutch artist Folkert de Jong will discuss the evolution of his work over the past twenty years, discussing themes of power, economy, politics, war, and ecology in his work. Recent solo exhibitions of his work have been presented at James Cohan Gallery, NYC; Musee d'Evreux, France; Middelheim Museum Antwerp, Belgium; Mudam Modern Art Museum, Luxembourg; Portland Art Museum; Mackintosh Museum Glasgow, Scotland; Musas Museo de Arte de Sonora, Hemosillo, Mexico; Wadsworth Atheneum Museum, Hartford; and the Hudson Valley Center for Contemporary Art. His work has been included in notable group exhibitions including After Picasso: 80 Contemporary Artists at the Wexner Center for the Arts; Cryptic: The Use of Allegory in Contemporary Art at the Contemporary Art Museum, St. Louis; and Shape of Things to Come: New Sculpture at Saatchi Gallery, London.

BRILLO BOX (3¢ OFF) SCREENING AND DISCUSSION | LISANNE SKYLER WITH PETER YOUNG

Tuesday, April 17 - 6pm-7pm

When filmmaker Lisanne Skyler was a baby, an Andy Warhol "Brillo Box" sculpture served as a coffee table, until her father traded it for a drawing by Peter Young. The HBO Documentary Film Brillo Box (3¢ off), an official selection of the 54th New York Film Festival, tracks the remarkable journey of an iconic Andy Warhol sculpture from one family's living room through the global art market, exploring the ephemeral nature of art and value.

Lisanne Skyler is a writer/director of numerous award-winning feature, documentary and short films that have been presented at such festivals as Sundance Film Festival, Venice Film Festival, New York Film Festival and Cinéma du Réel in Paris. Recent work includes *A Few Things About Robert Irwin* for the LACMA Art + Film Series. Skyler is an Associate Professor at the University of Arizona School of Theatre, Film and Television.

Peter Young has been the subject of major retrospectives at PS1 and MOCA Tucson. His work is featured in collections of such institutions as the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York; The Museum of Modern Art, New York; San Francisco Museum of Modern Art; University of Texas, Austin; and the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York, among many others.

DR. PAUL IVEY

Tuesday, May 1 - 6pm-7pm

Dr. Paul Ivey is Professor of Art History teaching Modern and Contemporary Art. He researches the built environments and compounds of alternative and esoteric American religious and communal groups. He is the author of Radiance from Halcyon: A Utopian Experiment in Religion and Science and Prayers in Stone: Christian Science Architecture in the United States, 1894-1930. His research interests include metaphysical, Eastern, and esoteric religions in the United States that evolved during the Progressive Era. For this lecture, Dr. Ivey will be presenting the lecture "Propaganda and Modern and Contemporary Political Art."

RACHEL FRANK

Thursday, May 10 - 6pm-7pm

MOCA Tucson artist-in-residence Rachel Frank merges the disciplines of sculpture, video and performance. Drawing from environmental theory, political activism, and research into natural history, Frank makes large-scale masks and sculptural objects that interact with site-specific landscapes either through Rewilding performances that seek to engage with the landscapes' memory and restore past ecosystems, or with video works concerned with natural history, extinction, and loss. For this talk, Frank will discuss the evolution of her environmentally-based work and introduce the focus of her residency at MOCA, a project based on the Sonoran Pronghorn that examines the intersection of wildlife, wildlife corridors, borders, and drought in the borderlands region of the Southern Arizona Sonoran Desert.

AMANDA CACHIA | CURATING DISABILITY, ACCESS, AND ADVOCACY

Thursday, May 24 - 6pm-7pm

Amanda Cachia will discuss her critical dis/ability curatorial practice, and her approach to the politics of creative access. The idea is to advance a curatorial model for a contemporary art exhibition that can be made accessible to an array of complex embodiments, where, for example, American Sign Language, captioning, and written and audio translations of sound and image are embedded into the material, structural and conceptual aspects of the exhibition. The presentation will include an overview of Cachia's recently curated exhibitions, including Sweet Gongs Vibrating at the San Diego Art Institute (2016) in California, Flesh of the World at the University of Toronto (2015) in Canada, and LOUD silence at California State University Fullerton in Los Angeles and the University of California San Diego (2014-2015). She will also provide a preview of her upcoming exhibition at the Owens Art Gallery at Mount Allison University in Sackville, New Brunswick, Canada, which opens in Fall, 2018, entitled, Automatisme Ambulatoire: Hysteria, Imitation, Performance. Cachia has curated over forty exhibitions, many of which iterate disability politics in contemporary art. She is an Assistant Professor of Art History at Moreno Valley College in Riverside, California, and director of the new Moreno Valley College Art Gallery, scheduled to open in fall 2018.

BEN'S BELLS AND EMERGE! | KINDNESS AND MASCULINITY

Thursday, June 7 - 6pm-7pm

The ways that men and boys are often socialized in the U.S. limits their capacity to be vulnerable and to empathize with others. So how do we create a new standard for masculinity based in the strengths of kindness? This talk, co-led by Emerge! Center Against Domestic Abuse and Ben's Bells Project, will analyze gendered social norms, explain the science of kindness as key to understanding our mental experience, and suggest kind actions for improving our communities through setting new standards for masculinity.

DR. CAROL BARNES | MEMORY AND THE AGING BRAIN

Tuesday, June 12 - 6pm-7pm

Join 2018 MOCA Local Genius Dr. Carol Barnes as she discusses changes in memory occurring during the normal process of aging. More severe memory impairment is characteristic of dementing illnesses that occur in some older individuals. Ideas about the aging brain have evolved away from it being viewed as an organ of passive deterioration towards the realization that it is capable of remarkable adaptation. The lecture will discuss how memory is changed during normal aging, as distinguished from pathological conditions, some of the brain changes responsible for these cognitive changes, and some of the current thinking about how to optimize brain and mental functions throughout life.

MOCA Tucson is partnering with the Tucson Noise Symposium, a series of talks, workshops, and performances on the University of Arizona campus and throughout Tucson that brings together the work of artists, academics, and listeners to consider the experience of noise and its many meanings.

MOCA Tucson will be sponsoring the work of Bonnie Jones and Suzanne Thorpe. Jones and Thorpe will present a lecture at the University of Arizona on Tuesday, April 24th at 4pm in ENR2, Room 210. They will also lead a TECHNE workshop for women and girls at MOCA on Wednesday, and performing at MOCA at 7:30pm on Wednesday, April 25th with Karima Walker and Igloo Martian.

For this performance Bonnie Jones (Electronics) and Suzanne Thorpe (Flute, Electronics), two critically acclaimed musicians active internationally on the experimental scene, will perform their improvised duo *Convergence & Divergence*, in 3 Parts.

SUZANNE THORPE is a musician and composer who extends her practice with an ever-evolving set-up of analogue and digital software components. She composes site-specific works that employ psychoacoustic phenomena, aural harmonics and tuned filtering systems that have been presented at Issue Project Room (NYC), Judson Church (NYC), Diapason (NYC), Megapolis Festival (Baltimore), Activating the Medium Festival (San Francisco), SlowFloat (the Delaware River), la botanica (Houston) and exhibited at Kleio Gallery (NYC), Exit Art (NYC) and the Lightship Frying Pan. As an improviser, Thorpe has performed with Chris Brown, Chris Cogburn, Annette Krebs, Maggie Nicols, Pauline Oliveros, Gino Robair, Miya Masaoka, Fred Frith, Ulrich Krieger, Zbigniew Karkowski, Anti-Matter, Miguel Frasconi, and Zeena Parkins among others. She is a founding member of critically acclaimed Mercury Rev, with whom she composed, performed, recorded, produced and toured from 1989 through 1998, earning numerous critical accolades and a gold record for 1998's Deserters' Songs. She has appeared on over 20 recordings on labels such as Sony, V2, Beggars Banquet, Geffen, Specific Recordings, and Tape Drift, and can most recently be heard on J Mascis' solo record Several Shades of Why.

BONNIE JONES is a Korean-American interdisciplinary artist working primarily with sound and text. As a composer, and improviser she re-purposes digital delay pedals as circuit-bent electronic instruments, directly playing the exposed circuit boards with instrument cables to produce raw and often chaotic electronic sound. Her sound palette challenges the accepted languages of contemporary music as well as the conventional modes of playing associated with electronic musicians. Jones' multimedia performance works use projected text and live writing to improvise with musicians, video artists, dancers, and other writers. The work draws on her background as a poet and explores a form of writing. "off-the-page" that directly interacts with the audience and other collaborators. Jones has performed her work in the US, Europe and Asia, and has appeared in the ErstQuake Festival (NYC), No Idea Festival (TX), Cha' ak' ab Paaxil Festival (Mexico), and High Zero Festival (MD). Jones has received several awards and recognitions including a Fulbright Fellowship, Meet the Composer Global Connections Grants, and an artist residency at STEIM (electronic music foundation in Amsterdam). Jones received her MFA from Bard College's Milton Avery School for Fine Arts. She is also the co-founder of the Transmodern Festival (festival entering its 7th year in Baltimore) and curator / organizer of the Los Solos Series (a performance series presenting solo works of female artists).

KHALED JARRAR: I'M GOOD AT SHOOTING, BAD AT PAINTING

Artist Khaled Jarrar will create paintings in the desert, using his gun to splatter paint across canvas. Says the artist: "Gently I press the trigger, the bullet capable of reaching hundreds of meters in less than a second. Pressing it is always sensitive and fragile; it is like touching something that has never been touched before. Undoubtedly, the bullet will go fast and hit the target to create colorful shapes, exposing how powerless we can be if we are within its frame. I try to engender a methodology that allows me to create art where I can use the skills that I learned as a trained soldier. This methodology is a space of metaphors, displaying a natural analogy of my accumulated skills as both artist and soldier. I was trained to shoot, to follow rules, and I was good at it."

KHALED JARRAR (Ramallah, Palestine and Tucson, AZ) creates work that explores the impact of modern- day power struggles on ordinary citizens, while seeking to maximize the social potential of artistic interventions. His work has been shown across the world in venues such as the New Museum (NYC), Aga Khan Museum (Toronto), USF Contemporary Art Museum (Tampa) and the 7th Berlin Biennale.
