MOCA Tucson is the pre-eminent, artist-centered contemporary art institution in the Southwest. We believe that art has the power to change the world. We cultivate critical dialogue between artists and audiences about today's world; support artists through the production and presentation of new, experimental work; and educate the artists and audiences of tomorrow.





# LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends.

**2023** was a year of tremendous growth for MOCA Tucson—we implemented a shared leadership and curatorial model, exponentially increased engagement, catalyzed new, generative collaborations with local organizations, and commissioned over 50 new, experimental works by today's leading artists.

MOCA endeavors to be a **highly collaborative organization**, and its new leadership and curatorial model—shared by Laura Copelin and myself (Julio César Morales)—aligns the museum's operations with this goal. We changed MOCA's bylaws to **remove traditional expectations and barriers to entry** and welcomed an **impressive new cohort of trustees**—Annamaria Biagini, Andy Burgess, Albert Chamillard, Javier Duran, Farid Matuk, Alex Miller, Anne Ranek—who are **leaders in their respective fields**, from poetry and law to art and academia.

In 2023, we reached 16,716 individuals, a 30% increase from the prior year, and event participation increased by 20%. We engaged 5,000 adults through 35 public programs and served 8,500 youth in 80 Title I schools across Pima County. We also closed for two of Tucson's hottest months to conserve energy onsite and to allow for more focused creative visioning for the small team at MOCA. Even with this strategic closure, overall engagement increased.

Our **exhibition program** amplified artists whose work and extended practices offered **radical examinations** and **creative solutions** to our most urgent socio-cultural issues. We presented work by Raven Chacon, Na Mira, Keioui Keijaun Thomas, and Cecilia Vicuña in projects supported by national granting agencies and foundations, including **The Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts**, Foundation for Contemporary Arts, and the **National Endowment for the Arts**.

MOCA was also selected by the Warhol Foundation to continue serving as a regranting partner to distribute funds to artists and collectives across Pima County – the museum's **Night Bloom: Grants for Artists program has infused \$180,000 into our creative communities** since its launch in 2020. In other news, MOCA was invited by the **Mellon Foundation** to apply for the museum's largest grant to date, which was awarded in early 2024.

**Looking ahead**, MOCA envisions an evolution of its physical spaces, organizational structures, and administrative processes. Our team is building a strategic plan to extend our space to artists, academic and community partners, grassroots organizations, and the public to **cultivate interdisciplinary connections in the rich context of the borderlands**. We look forward to having you with us over the next year as we realize experimental programs and imagine together what a museum of the future can be.

### 2023 EXHIBITIONS

Fundamentally interdisciplinary and experimental, MOCA's 2023 exhibitions amplified artists whose work offered **radical examinations** and **creative solutions** to our most urgent socio-cultural issues. Our 2023 exhibiting artists identified with and responded to a **diversity of critical perspectives, geographies, cultures, and histories,** and many were invited to be in residence in Tucson and to co-create public and education programs.

In the Great Hall, MOCA presented a major exhibition by **Cecilia Vicuña**, whose sprawling installation was inspired by the Sonoran Desert's communities, ecologies, and interconnections. The installation continued a new arc in the artist's work, which began in 2021 at the Guggenheim Museum, New York and continued at Tate Modern, London. Next, MOCA presented the work of **Keioui Keijaun Thomas**, whose major exhibition, commissioned performances, and community generated programming imagined new, interdependent ways to relate to the American landscape. This was the first solo museum exhibition by Thomas, and built on over a decade of the artist's work exploring the affective and material conditions of Black and trans identity.

In the East Wing Galleries, MOCA presented the first solo museum exhibition by **Na Mira**, an artist who uses intuitive and experimental processes to create immersive moving image installations. The newly commissioned work at MOCA was the most recent iteration of a video installation presented at the 2022 Whitney Biennial. Simultaneously, MOCA presented a solo exhibition by **Raven Chacon**, a Pulitzer Prize-winning composer and artist. The exhibition celebrated sound as a medium for resistance and connection, amplified Indigenous women's voices, and invited local musicians to perform Chacon's scores.

\*Chacon was awarded a prestigious 2023 MacArthur "Genius" Fellowship during the run of his exhibition at MOCA Tucson.

Na Mira: Subrosa

March 24, 2023 - January 21, 2024

\*Mira will present work at the 2024 Venice Biennale following her first solo museum exhibition at MOCA Tucson.

October 20, 2023 - February 18, 2024

\*Artists, poets, performers, community organizers, and more were invited to use the Oasis, a soft physical space within the exhibition designed to host programming and offer rest to museum visitors.

### DIGITAL ENGAGEMENT

MOCA continues to reach new audiences and expand its digital interactions. The museum's **Instagram account** directly engaged nearly **50,000 users**, a 51% increase from the previous year, and now has more than **13,000 followers**. Our e-newsletters averaged a 42% open rate, a more than 15% increase from the previous year.

# 2021 EDUCATION & PROGRAMS

In 2023, MOCA produced and co-presented **35 public programs**. Overall, the museum reached nearly **5,000 individuals** through free public programs alone—a **20% increase from the previous year**. The museum's popular **Free Third Thursday** program brought over **60 local organizations**, musicians, and artists to showcase their expertise and host programs at the museum, and partnered with dozens of small businesses. In the last year, this program reached **over 1,800 community members**, with an average attendance of more than 250 people per month.

MOCA's **education programs** are an integral aspect of the museum's public programming and invite pathways for **imaginative and critical engagement in contemporary art**. In 2023, the museum continued to offer its signature programs, Minor Mutiny, Satellite, and Stay Gold. MOCA Satellite alone provided over **8,500 K-12 youth at 80 Title 1 schools** regular classroom-based arts education; this free mobile arts learning program brought teaching artists into classrooms across 8 Pima County districts to engage youth and certified educators in curriculum connected to MOCA exhibition themes and content.

### NIGHT BLOOM: GRANTS TO ARTISTS

Night Bloom: Grants for Artists is a grant program organized in partnership with **The Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts** that funds collaboratively-focused visual arts projects by individual artists and artist groups within Tucson and the broader Sonoran Desert region. Since launching the program in 2020, Night Bloom has provided **\$180,000** in direct funds to artists working in Pima County.

The 2023 grant cohort included **10 projects** by individual artists and artist groups:

### **2023 GALA**

Over **360 attendees** joined our celebration as we honored the incredible contributions of sociologist and researcher **Jennifer Carlson, Ph.D.**; hydrologist **Karletta Chief, Ph.D.** (**Diné**); sociologist **Celestino Fernández, Ph.D.**; baker and Barrio Bread founder **Don Guerra**; and late writer and journalist **Tom Miller**.

### **FALL FUNDRAISERS**

MOCA's fall season included a **Membership Drive** with new MOCA **merchandise by artist Yu Yu Shiratori** and a series of fundraising events, bringing together diverse audiences to support the museum's mission. The season included **Chorizo Dancehall**, a genre-hopping dance party takeover at the museum for our annual fall fundraiser, and **MOCA Travels: Nogales**, an all-day tour and art experience on both sides of the border with a celebratory dinner and live music at Holler and Saunders.



### **FY23 FINANCES**

**FY23 was a planned growth year for MOCA**. The museum appointed new executive leadership in Julio César Morales, retained Laura Copelin in its leadership team, and advanced key core staff members.

Increasing much needed staff capacity was essential for meeting future organizational growth and to undergird a truly progressive vision for MOCA.

While the museum maintained fundraising initiatives, its **focus was on expanding operations**, **partnerships**, **and audience engagement**, **which all increased exponentially**. MOCA's new leadership team also prioritized accessibility, establishing pay-what-you-wish Sundays at the museum and **amending board bylaws** to make dues voluntary. The latter was a year-long board governance reform process and opened MOCA's board to broader community participation – it resulted in the addition of a cohort of seven new trustees in December 2023.

MOCA underspent on its planned budget, but fell short in board and individual giving and had some key grant awards pushed to FY24. MOCA is working to broaden its base of support so that it does not depend on one or two major donors or foundations to sustain operations – a common challenge for nonprofits. Much of FY23 was spent crystallizing a future vision for the museum and laying the groundwork for a transformational multi-year grant from the Mellon Foundation – the largest grant MOCA has been awarded to date – which was applied for in 2023 and received in early 2024.

FY23 demonstrated the importance of greater organizational capacity, and also the importance of time, care, and a diversity of perspectives in board and staff to realize critical growth and a progressive and sustainable vision for the museum.

# FOUNDATION SUPPORT

In 2023, MOCA earned **resounding support from local and national foundations and granting agencies**, receiving more than \$250,000 from existing and new supporters. Major support for MOCA's exhibitions and programs continued to be provided by the **National Endowment for the Arts and The Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts**, who also funded the museum's regranting initiative, Night Bloom, which directly funded 10 projects by individual artists and artist groups for community-oriented and experimental art projects. Alongside MOCA's exhibitions, the museum's educational initiatives were supported in large part by the **Windgate Foundation**, who funded MOCA Satellite, and **E.A. Michelson Philanthropies**, who funded the museum's intergenerational programs Stay Gold and School of Drag.


